There is still much concern about Western Riverside with Prince Charles commenting adversely on the height of some of the buildings and ICOMOS concerned about the impact of the scheme on the World Heritage status.

There were also concerns about the planning procedures experienced during the consideration of the Holbourne Museum Planning application. It was felt there were several areas of bias in the report and

important omissions, so a letter to the ombudsman should be considered.

here have been two meetings of FedBRA FedBRA has objected to 400% increases in resi-(Federation of Bath Residents' Associations) dents' car parking charges. The level of increases should not exceed the percentage rise in council tax.

The number of visitors' permits for residents over 60 has been reduced and residents in the city centre cannot get them.

Air pollution in Bath continues to worsen and the Council's Cabinet has agreed that an Air Quality Management Area should be declared covering the whole of the main road network in the city, and that officials should draw up plans to reduce pollution within the next year.

The Federation has complained to the Environment Agency about pollution in the River Avon, which is felt might come from cattle farms which border the river. We have not had a satisfactory response.

In a private initiative, supported by the Federation, the City of Bath Forum is holding a series of meetings to discuss topical subjects affecting Bath, so the public might be informed of issues before decisions are taken. The first meeting was held in March.

H as the Widcombe Association achieved anything in the last six months?

Do we fulfil our aims? Shall we maintain our membership numbers? Do our opinions count? Are your subscriptions well spent?

Maybe you have other questions, perhaps more specific and detailed; the AGM will be your chance to air them publicly. The committee are always willing to deal with enquiries.

Returning to my questions, our aims arise from our constitution and so our major *raisons d'âre* are the removal of through traffic from our village street (see photo below), protection from unsuitable development, and the enhancement of Widcombe. The Rossiter Road sub-committee are working on the first while our planning team have made many comments on major and small local changes. The Abbey Cemetery helpers have worked wonders on that unique historic site. Many thanks to all who have taken part.

Channelling residents' opinions and maintaining a dialogue with the council is a task for all the committee, often time consuming and frustrating. Whether it be complaints about street cleaning, rubbish and litter or measures to reduce speeding, promote safety and provide parking, issues require constant contact with councillors and council officers and each item may need following up for years. But we are encouraged that extra parking has been provided for the Widcombe Parade area, the traffic calming project on Widcombe Hill is almost complete, rumble strips there are now approved; discussions on Greenway Lane, Lyncombe Vale and Lyncombe Hill are ongoing.

With Sarah in charge, the promotion of social events has never been a problem, although we none of us underestimate the organization that leads to such success. Last year the committee voted that when we have surplus funds from events, they should be spent on projects in Widcombe. The Mummers raised money to help St Matthew's Church with repairs to their paving; the Christmas concert donated the proceeds to the 2008 Widcombe Rising. That will be the destination too for the profits from our short 2008 Summer Festival. Thus, when one also considers Beating the Bounds, over £1,000 per annum goes to community activities. One day, we may be able to enhance the Halfpenny Bridge and provide seats, trees and flowers for Widcombe Parade.

Researching local history has been confined to our recordings at Abbey Cemetery. Dr Philip Bendall has focused our clearing efforts and is establishing an amazing review of those buried and their lives. To sample his results please peruse the revamped Widcombe Association website. Can we look forward to a future exhibition by the Abbey Cemetery team?

But exhibitions have fallen off the agenda recently and we still have a committee vacancy for someone creative and artistic with interests in local history and in this varied parish of Widcombe. Mike Mapstone has kindly agreed to start sorting out our archive and we hope to be able to store it more accessibly in the near future. So please come forward, and if the role appeals to you, contact Rosemary Emsley. What about "Artisans of Widcombe", "Shopping in our Street in the Forties", "Wildlife on our Waterways", "Gracious Houses"? I'm sure you can do better.

Membership numbers have been in decline over the last two years. We have boasted over 700 during my time as Chairman and in order to add weight to our views, and to finance our activities, we need to maintain such a total. The possible reasons may be the change of due date for subscriptions to 1st January, lack of effective reminders at the end of January, or forgetfulness (which would be my excuse). Generally your enthusiastic support does not seem to wane. Certainly recent reminders have lifted our present total.

We hope you will understand our switch from standing orders to direct debits to greatly reduce our administration time. Please do adopt the new system. You may of course still pay by cash or cheque if you prefer.

In fact membership administration has proved a weighty task and Myra Brown has resigned. We are very pleased that David Waterstone has volunteered to take it on. Many thanks to Myra and welcome to David.

Sadly too Stuart McAndrew has resigned from the committee but will still help at meetings and with newsletter distribution. He has been very successful on our "Sales" table and Sandie enjoys helping with refreshments at meetings so we shall see them often. Ken Scott is new to the committee and will continue much of Stuart's other work.

Of the other two, one is currently impossible to implement and lastly the plea for improvements to the Widcombe play area is under consideration but total funding for such work has to be shared throughout B&NES and we shall have to wait and see.

We are enclosing a separate letter about our new Direct Debit scheme, which now replaces the standing order scheme.

We have been working hard to increase our business membership and last month held a very successful meeting which 17 traders and 9 of our committee attended. This was a chance to find out about our local traders' concerns, talk about advertising in the newsletter and on the website, update them on Rossiter Road and this year's Widcombe Rising, and ask them if they would consider giving a small discount to WA members. 12 traders agreed.

With this newsletter, paid up members will find a new gold membership card for the two main members of the household. This is a permanent card. Please sign it. The dated sticky label gives a list of traders offering discounts. It will be replaced annually and sent to current members with the spring newsletter. Cards will therefore be valid from April to April each year. Traders offering discounts are shown on the rear cover. Discounts will only be given on sight of signed and valid cards.

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
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
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Law and Order

DACT stands for **Partnership and Communities**

Together. It is a police-led initiative which invites communities to let them know their concemes and problems. The last meeting, held in January, had a small attendance, but a list of priorities was decided upon. These are as follows:

- Excessive speed in Lyncombe Vale and
- Rosemount Lane
- Begging/vagrancy on Halfpenny Bridge
- Better cycling routes

These meetings are open to all and are a good way of raising your concerns with the people who can help. The next meeting will be in May 2008. Details will be found on the Avon and Somerset Police website or by telephoning 0845 456 7000

Neighbourhood Watch. Many of our areas within Widcombe have their own Neighbourhood Watch scheme and these are an excellent way of protecting our homes and property. The Widcombe ward has its own "Beat Box" newsletter, available through Bath Police Station (0847 4567000) with lots of hints and messages to help us keep safe.

If you do not have a neighbourhood watch in you untarea please consider forming one. Community safety Ma cannot be successfully achieved by the constabulary alone and these groups are extremely important partners in the process.

Greenway Lane

A t a recent meeting between Ward Councillors, Councillor Gerrish and representatives of Greenway with Andrew Moss, Interim Highways and Parking Manager, a report of residents' observations was considered in order to find possibilities for preventing traffic using Greenway Lane and Lyncombe Hill as a route to and from Wellsway to the Churchill Gyratory or Pulteney Road. A bus lane is to be introduced on Wellsway in six to twelve months time and traffic will not be able to cross to Greenway Lane from Hatfield Road nor turn right from Wellsway into Greenway Lane and the bottom of Entry Hill. That should reduce the "rat-running" and after some months the Greenway Lane traffic will be reviewed. Should further improvement be necessary, an Access Only section could be introduced on Entry Hill. This low intervention policy with evaluation at each stage should prevent the need for changes in layout, preserve the nature of the area and not restrict the use for residents in Lyncombe Vale, Lyncombe Vale Road and Rosemount Lane.

the engineers and the sub-committee, because of necessary tasks which must be completed before actual testing and modelling can proceed. Surveyors must be brought in to do an up-to-date topographical survey. Also links with SouthGate and the Bath Package mean that traffic figures coordinating all three schemes must be established before modelling the Rossiter Road project. Together, these factors are likely to cause delay of up to two months and we are not likely to have a final feasibility report until June.

Many thanks to the Rossiter Road sub-committee especially to Don Lovell who has decided to leave us. Fortunately, Peter Metcal fe will be joining us.



Traffic, Safety and Parking

We have asked many times for improved safety measures at the Widcombe Junior School crossing where the railings have now been demolished by passing traffic <u>five</u> times. At last some effective action is imminent. Cross hatching and lining will steer the traffic in both directions into lanes through the barriers. A tall more visible sign on the westbound side will warn approaching traffic. The reinstated railings will be painted white. Road surfacing has been applied to reduce speeds. Later when funding is released, there will be lighting. Also changes will be made to road markings near the hotel to help with speed reduction.

We asked for measures to make **Prior Park Road** safer several years ago and now there will be some action. Measurements of speeds did not show excesses for all traffic, but many vehicles were moving too fast for pedestrian safety. Although a crossing near Lyncombe Vale was considered dangerous, the association has continued to campaign for one near the foot of Forefield Rise and today we have heard that it is approved and funds will be available from April 2008. Meanwhile, Councillor Brook Whelan has been campaigning success fully for 30mph roundels on the road. **Church Street** parking changes now allow access through the road where before vehicles were often impeded by park ed cars. Residents were then worried about increases in traffic and speeds. In fact we learnt today that their fears were completely unfounded. In a 7-day count, very little traffic passed through, only 3 vehicles exceeded 26 mph and those were at 6am, 7am and 4pm: there was no speeding. Most vehicles in both directions passed a good deal slower than that. There were no peaks in traffic flows at school times. To prevent unsuitable vehicles trying to pass through, Brook is seeking to remove Church Street (and later Rosemount Lane) from sat nay systems.

Alternate parking, a flashing sign above Macaulay Buildings and now rumble strips to slow traffic on the Macaulay bend should at last improve safety on **Widcombe Hill**. We shall get too a couple of short term parking spaces between Tyning and Tyning End. A dangerous parking bay is being removed from **Lyncombe Hill** and broken paving is being replaced.

All in all, many of our requests have now been met and Widcombe should be a somewhat safer place.

Streetscape Ken Scott You may have read in the Chronicle of the campaign to reduce underage drinking by asking the McColl group of shops to remove the "Booze Buster" sign from the front of their shops. Your committee has written to

McColls with the same request, and is playing an active part along with local councillors to build up a response via a petition from the whole area. Arrangements are being made to place the petition in Widcombe Surgery.

Concern has been raised on the collection or non-collection of cardboard by the council. We understand that traders who use the prepaid refuse collection can have their cardboard collected with their refuse. (The council obtains revenue from its bulk recycling.) Meanwhile normal householders can recycle theirs on the special fortnightly collections. Details and dates differ throughout the area and your own dates can be checked with the council on 01225 394041. All areas have a council Neighbourhood Enforcement Officer and good contacts for our area are Bill Waters or Wayne Honey on 396195 or 396973.



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

The three major sites affecting us in Widcome have all seen some development during the six months since the last newsletter.

The 5 hectare **SouthGate** development is a hive of activity with foundations and underground car parks being dug out in some areas whilst in others structural work has reached first floor level. The developer appears to be on track to open the Bus Station and Southgate Street part of the development on time by the summer of 2009 and the remainder the following year.



The 18 hectare **Western Riverside** development stretching from Windsor Bridge in the west to Homebase in the east has received approval from the Council and the Government to start on the first stage of work on the eastern half of the site. This will be primarily residential accommodation limited to 6 storeys in height with two additional buildings of 8 and 9 storeys - the tallest being approximately

6 metres lower than the existing gasometers,

The **South Quays site** (between the other two sites and adjacent to the Lower Bristol Road) is still under discussion. Sir James Dyson is hoping to build a stylish new School of Design Innovation, catering for 2,500 14 to 19year-olds. There has been opposition to this project on the grounds of flood risk, and also because of the architectural value of the 19thcentury Newark Works, which stand on the site. The design now incorporates the old façade of the Newark Works, as can be seen in the drawing at right. Last month the coun-

cil's development control committee voted 7 to 5 to agree to the plans in principle, so it seems likely that the plan will go ahead. The Widcombe Association is in favour of the School, providing that studies show that local infrastructure can cope.

Local Planning Samy Ramasamy

The Widcombe Association has been vigilant in examining the local planning applications and supporting the essential character of Widcombe. In particular, we successfully objected to the applications for converting residential houses in Holloway and Calton Walk into flats. Planning permission for the erection of a two storey house in place of the public toilet at Widcombe Parade is still pending.

University Expansion

The second stage of consultation on the expansion of the University of Bath invites residents and others to take part in an interactive exhibition in the Library and Learning Centre between April 2nd and 9th
