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
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#### Chairman's Column Richard Wales

C ince publication of the autumn Newsletter, the issue of the greatest importance, and which has taken up the most time, has been Rossiter Road Unfortunately B&NES Council decided to hold their public consultation at precisely the time that planned to be abroad on holiday. Needless to say the holiday prevailed! Widcombe residents will have received the Council questionnaire and the Association's letter: also, many of you will have attended the public exhibition. The Association has made a formal response to the consultation and a summary is given elsewhere in this newsletter. The full text is available on the web site. To reach this stage has involved an enormous amount of work. including many meetings with Council officers and cabinet members. We are extremely fortunate in having such a well-qualified sub-committee who have found the time to deal with this issue. Mike Wrigley, with his planning expertise has been invaluable in developing the urban planning and public realm aspects of our response whilst Peter Hendy has, somehow, found time, from his demanding day job as the Mayor of London's Commissioner for Transport, to advise and help negotiate on our behalf. The battle continues, as we have to ensure that, not only is the scheme implemented without delay. but also proper regard is given to urban planning. Our message has always been that this not a highways engineering project but an important piece of urban renewal.

Another matter that keeps popping up is the Two Tunnels cycle route. Sustrans have resurrected the prospect of a major ramped access on allotment land in Lyncombe Vale. Greenway! and the WA agreed that a public consultation would be an appropriate way of dealing with this issue but Sustrans are now suggesting that a consultation event should be held in the City centre, as well as in Widcombe. Needless to say, we have objected strongly to this and a further meeting will be held in April before any final decisions are made

Having served nearly three years as your Chairman. I shall be retiring at the AGM and shall not be seeking re-election. However, in view of the critica stage we have reached in the Rossiter Road saga, shall, for the time being, be continuing as Chairman of the Rossiter Road sub-committee. My period on the Committee reminds me of the old Chinese curse - "may you live in interesting times". In fact, there

have been many fascinating issues to review and discuss. Although this has resulted in a lot of hard work, with many voluminous B&NES Council documents to study. I have been most fortunate in having a good-humoured committee team, so our meetings involve laughter and some frivolity as well as serious consideration of matters affecting our community.

It is invidious to single out individuals, but I must mention our Secretary, Ro Emsley, who will also be retiring at the AGM. Ro has been an invaluable support. Typical of her dedication, she has found a worthy successor and trained her for the job!

I am delighted to announce that the Committee have decided to nominate Paddy Doyle, our Vice Chairman, as my successor. Quite apart from his high profile activities with Songs of Widcombe and Bath, Paddy is responsible for our web site. Earlier this year, I was approached by Radio Somerset to speak on a Saturday morning programme involving the A-Z of Somerset place names. Widcombe had been chosen to represent the W's, due to our outstanding web site! I am confident that the Association's affairs will be in safe hands.

#### Treasurer's Report

The Association's finances remain sound. We made a small surplus of income over expenditure in the year to December 2010 of £600 (last year £1,536). We have £6,884 (last year £6,981) of net assets including £320 (last year £911) in a fund reserved for the Abbey Cemetery.

#### How we spend our money

We have a total income, including from subscriptions and events, of £18, 789. This enables us to fund our activities and events and make donations to relevant local causes.

Donations in 2010 were made to Natural Theatre Co for Widcombe Rising and their mezzanine appeal (£2,993), Beechen Cliff School – music appeal (£600) and Widcombe Junior School - Wrobotiers (£200).

The remainder of funds were used to run our events and clubs (£9,664), administration costs (£1918), our share of the horse trough conservation costs (£700), purchases to support our activities (£2,547). There was also work undertaken on the trees at the Abbey Cemetery (£625).

A summary of the independently reviewed accounts is included below. Full accounts, are available at the AGM and subsequently on our website.

#### Membership Renewal

Membership is due for the 2011 year from 1 January 2011 so you should have now paid. Thank you to all who have done so. This can be via direct debit, or by cash or cheque to the membership secretary. Please, if you have a standing order, make sure that it is for the right amount of £6 (or £15 for business members) and if you pay by direct debit you must cancel any pre-existing standing orders with your bank (we can not do this for you). We have a small backlog of some 20 BACS payments which we hope to process in the next few weeks so please bear with us.

WA membership offers great value for money. You can get discounts at local businesses that will not only quickly repay your subscription but also support local firms and our events and help keep Widcombe vibrant.

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
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#### **Events**

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#### Abbey Cemetery – A New Path

rrangements are well advanced for the dedication of a permissive path from the main entrance of the Cemetery up to the Mortuary chapel and then along the track beside the Roman Catholic Cemetery and out into Blind Lane. In the old days this track is believed to have been used by hearses.

Volunteers from The Widcombe Association and the Cotswold Wardens are hard at work on the track and surrounding woodland area (see picture), which enjoys an elevated position with magnificent views over the city. There are remains of a small building which it is understood was once used by a watchman/superintendant/gardener. At the same time efforts are being made to restore this beautiful piece of ground and also to create a vantage point for visitors to rest and take in the beautiful scenery.

The process has been quite complicated. First of all the Abbey had to arrange for a section of the boundary wall with the Roman Catholic Burial Ground to be rebuilt and the Cotswold Wardens then started clearing the undergrowth and installed a kissing gate into Blind Lane. Planning consent had to be obtained to remove trees/branches of trees overhanging the path before the tree surgeons were able to move in. They were then on site for 3 ½ days. All the while, the clearing of the site of undergrowth – some huge laurels, and rubbish generally, has continued. It was a requirement that the tree work should be done outside the bird nesting season.

The path and whole area are going to be a very valuable facility for our community and will enable visitors walking to Prior Park Gardens or using the Popes Walk to do most of it over "country paths" rather than up Prior Park Road.

Our grateful thanks are due to Bath Abbey for their close cooperation and generous contributions to the funding of the initiative, to the Cotswold Wardens for providing work parties and to many of our own members.

Although the work continues, the opening date for the path with appropriate celebrations has been fixed for Saturday 25<sup>th</sup> June. This will also see the launch of a leaflet describing the walk from the Railway station via the Abbey Cemetery to the Landscape Garden and back by way of the lower gate. This will be downloadable from the WA website, and with a link from the NT website

embers of the congregation of St Thomas à Becket Church in Church Street, Widcombe have taken up the challenge of writing a new history of the church. The booklet will be launched at a Summer Drinks Evening on **Friday 1**<sup>st</sup> **July** at St Thomas (see What's On for details) and all proceeds from the sale of the booklet will go to church funds.

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
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The Rossiter Road Consultation -The Widcombe Association's Response to B&NES

Subject to the comments and recommendations below, the Widcombe Association strongly supports the proposed scheme.

Rossiter Road and Widcombe Parade are within the Bath World Heritage Site (WHS), the Bath Conservation Area and on the edge of the study area for the Public Realm and Movement Strategy for the Bath City Centre so the Association considers that:

- The design quality of all parts of the scheme should be consistent with the World Heritage Site Management Plan 2010-2016
- The standards of urban design



The Public Realm and Movement Strategy should be central to the design philosophy for the scheme.

Regarding traffic engineering issues, we recommend, if possible:

- Provision of a right turn from Rossiter Road into Lyncombe Hill
- A trial of temporary traffic signals (or none) at the White Hart junction.

Reconsideration of the short stretch of cycle lane within the carriageway on the north side of Rossiter Road.

Regeneration of Widcombe Parade has always been our key objective for this scheme so we urge the Council to:

- Prepare an urban design strategy for Widcombe Parade, to be carried out in parallel with the detailed engineering design.
- Landscape the area to the west of the Parade and include tree planting (to which the Association is willing to contribute)
- To design the area in front of the White Hart as a public space, not just a traffic junction
- Consider a more sympathetic approach to street lighting

Minimise the extent of street signing and road marking

There is an opportunity for the Council to invest in the stimulation of this important local centre.

We are keen to ensure the design of the scheme, overall, is to the highest standards and are anxious to engage with the Council to help achieve this. The WHS Management Plan includes an objective "to ensure that all traffic, transport and pedestrian management schemes enhance the value of the Site". In our view, the scheme does not meet this objective. We therefore ask that:

• An urban design input be included as part of the final detailing of the scheme
The need to fell mature trees is carefully re-considered and if necessary compromise to some degree the
engineering standards that have been applied.

An end date for the public consultation needs to be set and a firm project plan produced, incorporating provision for Widcombe Rising in June 2012.



#### **Traffic and Highways**

Whilst Rossiter Road has been our main focus over past months, other issues have received our attention too. Here are some of them.



Church Street – enforcement of 'Access Only' restriction, and deterrence of HGV traffic. After years of frustration and damage to cars and buildings, householders in Church Street formed themselves into an Association in Sept 2010 affiliated within the Widcombe Association. They have succeeded in putting in place many measures since that date, including more signage and monitoring of non-authorised use of the road. Their worst problem, though, appears to be satnav-guided HGVs (often from Eastern Europe) which attempt to transit the narrow road, get stuck, and then have to be helped to reverse out. Not an easy task and understandably one that causes much anguish. The police and the council officers are assisting the CSA in tackling these problems.

**Traffic Calming in Greenway Lane.** A scheme has been approved to impose a 20mph speed limit in Greenway Lane and to place speed tables in strategic spots along the road to encourage respect of this lower limit. At the time of going to press, we understand that the necessary roadworks are programmed to start in mid April. If and when the desired 'no right turn' from Wellsway to Greenway Lane will ever be put in place, though, remains uncertain – bogged down in the Council's planning morass, apparently.

**20 mph speed limit on Lyncombe Hill and adjoining roads**. A consultation exercise took place in autumn 2010. This has led to officers preparing a scheme in readiness for public consultation within the coming few weeks. As so often, though, details and timescales are hard to obtain. **Speed monitoring on Widcombe Hill** is an issue which arises regularly. It seems to many residents, at various points along the Hill, that cars often exceed the 30 mph limit – especially those going uphill from the very bottom, and those going downhill in the middle stretch. Unfortunately the speed monitoring which has been carried out by the Council at least three times in the last few years has not produced evidence of this. If the 'average' speed detected, over 24 hours, is less than 33 mph the Council does not consider any action is needed – even though clearly some cars will have been driven at much higher speeds than that. This is a thorny problem on which the Council will not be persuaded to shift their stance – and in the meantime nothing is done and frustrations grow stronger.

Relocation of the Pedestrian Crossing on Wells Road and Pedestrian Crossing on Prior Park Road abreast Widcome Rise and Forefield Rise. The Council has accepted that safety risks exist at these locations and so have added them to their 'Traffic and Safety Task Register'. However neither item is funded in the capital works programme. They will be considered for a place in next year's programme, but only in competition with other schemes that will be put forward. We will urge our Councillors to continue to press for these important road safety measures to be funded and then put in place.







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#### **Planning**

Bath and NE Somerset Core Strategy

n 16<sup>th</sup> December 2010 BANES issued their revised Draft Core Strategy which invited comments by 3<sup>rd</sup> February 2011. This replaced an earlier 2009 Core Strategy which promoted, amongst other things, 8000 new homes in the city. 2000 of which would form a neighbourhood extension at Newton St Loe or South Stoke.

The plan seeks to guide where development is to be permitted, how much we should have, what land should be protected and how places should change up to the year 2026.

The revised strategy is a much more realistic policy with the main aspects being as follows:

**Housing** The development of 6,000 new homes of which 3,500 will be on brown field sites in the central and western corridor and the remaining 2.500 from Bath's neighbourhoods (such as Widcombe) where surplus Ministry of Defence land will play a major role. The Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment (SHLAA) suggests that Foxhill could provide about 500 houses together with one hectare being used for offices.

**Economic Development** An increase in jobs from 61,700 to 67,000 in 2026 equating to 5,300 more jobs supported by an uplift in office accommodation of some 70,000 sq m.

**Shopping** The report makes no forecast on the amount of additional retail space required over this period other than to say that the primary shopping area should successfully absorb Southgate into the trading patterns of the city. Perhaps more importantly from Widcombe's perspective the policy is "to protect and where possible enhance the vitality of district and local centres".

**Transportation etc** There is a commitment "to support the development strategy for Bath with the implementation of necessary transport and other infrastructure to improve movement accessibility to employment and community facilities in Bath".

The Strategic Housing Land Availability Assessment or SHLAA was published at the same time in support of the Core Strategy. This lists only two sites in our area which are the Social Club on the corner with Widcombe Hill and the former Millhouse Audi garage showroom which are then discounted owing to their small size. Although in Lyncombe, it is worth mentioning that the Lower Field at Beechen Cliff School is included and is the subject of a campaign by Greenway! to get it removed.

#### Membership

urrently, 369 households have paid their subscriptions for 2011. That indicates that we have 633 members as I write but we may yet receive subscriptions from the 31 stragglers before the Newsletters are distributed. #### Federation of Bath Residents' Associations Mayveen Blackwell



Ver the last years The Federation of Bath Residents' Associations (Fobra) has become more efficient, effective, interactive and relevant than previously as a programme of new

initiatives has unrolled; there are student representatives, affiliates, sub-committees, observers at meetings, a more informative website and a will to involve new representatives from previously absent parts of the city. Voting in the forum is now related to number of households in each Association so Widcombe has considerable influence. Usually two Widcombe committee members attend each bimonthly meeting.

Predictably, issues covered have ranged over traffic and transport, the Rugby Club and possible developments on the Rec, the Cleanliness Task and Finish Group, winter weather proposals, pick-up and set-down arrangements at the station, the Big Society, sustainable levels of student recruitment, an exceptional presentation on the night-time economy with its problems and inevitably Planning which itself is related to the World Heritage Site (WHS). An earlier survey of representatives' opinions threw up the most important of their concerns which were The Character and Culture of Bath, Spending Cuts, Street Environment and Maintenance, plus Transport, Traffic and Pollution.

We were invited to a special Public Realm and Movement Programme exhibition by the Council whose initiatives should be coming into fruition by May of this year. In turn, we invited prominent Councillors, Officers and other important leaders from services such as the police to a reception. That gave each of us an opportunity to lobby and speak for our members; it was a valuable event to be repeated.

Work is progressing on the Localism Bill which may give more powers to organisations such as FoBRA and WA but the implications are not clear at the moment. Another important document under survey is the Draft Core Strategy which unfortunately makes little reference to the WHS. It does however refer to the Rossiter Road scheme as regenerating a local shopping area so our voice has been heard.

Peter opens a new exhibition "Bath Between the Snows" at the Victoria Art Gallery on 9th April. The exhibition runs until 2nd June.

#### VOLUNTEERS NEEDED


e always need new volunteers both for the committee and other jobs. At present we need somebody to look after our archive

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# PACT Partners & Communities Together

The February PACT meeting was modestly attended, suggesting perhaps that by and large we are content with the service rendered to us by our public servants. The

horrific nature of the problem with HGVs in Church St was well-illustrated with some recently-taken photos. The issue of through traffic provided some controversy when one attendee said he had been driving along Church St for over 30 years and was determined to continue to do so. PC Malcolm Webley said that his involvement has been the occasional stopping of cars and questioning of drivers. A £30 fixed penalty is available for drivers not 'accessing' the street, but has not so far been used.

The following priorities for future action were agreed at the meeting:

- 1. Graffiti in Widcombe.
- 2. Access only issue in Church St and problems with HGVs.
- 3. Speeding in Prior Park Rd.

The next PACT meeting is scheduled for 7.30 pm on **Tuesday 14th June 2011** at **Hayesfield Upper School**, Upper Oldfield Park. Hayesfield was chosen at Councillor Ian Gilchrist's behest to try to ensure that the western part of the Widcombe Ward did not feel isolated.



#### NUTS FOR ALL! Smallcombe Community Nuttery

In a few years' time, you should be able to harvest nuts (almonds, sweet chestnuts, cobnuts and walnuts) within walking distance of home, as a result of Transition Bath's and the National Trust's project in Smallcombe Vale. Transition Bath's food group encourages local food production, distribution and

retailing as a more sustainable alternative to imported food.

We are very pleased that the National Trust have provided the site by Farm Lane (near the new kissing gate). On a wet and windy Sunday, 13th February, over 40 volunteers turned up to plant 37 nut trees. Afterwards, everyone gathered around the fire to listen to music by the Widcombe Wobblers and to eat baked potatoes and roast chestnuts. individuals, organisations, Widcombe Association, B&NES and grant-giving bodies. As our Creative Learning Strategy states research shows that there are pockets of cultural and economic deprivation in the area which are in the worst 10% in the country.

When I say funding is in place, there is the little matter of the £20k that Naturals have lent from their reserves which has to be paid back over the next couple of years. (They also donated a further £20k which we don't have to pay back! This was money left over from our Millennium Dome residency which was astutely invested. So the Dome did some good after all!)

We hope to sign the builders off on May 4<sup>th</sup>. There will still be some decorating to do and some velvet curtains to sew (I might organise a volunteer day) but there it will be at last!

As to users, our Natural Youth Theatre has grown to over thirty strong if proof were needed that the facility will be well used!

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
